Traditionally the Third Lesson at the Easter Vigil (which falls this year on 26th March) related the story of Abraham, Isaac and the ram in the thicket to be found in Genesis 22. This glass panel is in the Holy Name Chapel, hidden behind the paneled stair to the small Organ Loft.

Manufactured by the London firm of Clayton & Bell, the busiest producer of Victorian glass, it is one of six rectangular panels which (with one other now lost) were ranged horizontally above the Altar of the Mission Church at the other end of Glentworth Street where our Founder, Fr. Letter from Father Gerald

Many preachers this year will be making much of the fact that 25th March - traditionally the Feast of the Annunciation - is Good Friday. There's a minority view among scholars that the Feast of the Annunciation, the celebration of Gabriel's announcement to Mary that she is to be the Mother of the Son of God was fixed on 25th March before the Emperor Constantine persuaded the church to keep Christ's nativity on 25th December in the fourth century. I suspect that this is a bit of a chicken-and-egg argument but there's no doubt that by the time of Constantine thought about the origins of Jesus had become very sophisticated. If what Christ achieves in the transformation of humanity is so great how does he connect heaven and earth from all eternity? What is the sign of salvation? The uncomfortable truth is in the shedding of blood.

Most of us are squeamish. Our culture shields us from blood in all sorts of ways. We rarely see meat butchered and we can buy all manner of parts of animals in the supermarket without ever seeing the whole carcase. If we injure ourselves we are whisked off to A&E. Few of us have seen battle. Yet the flow of blood is essential for the continuation of life. For men 'the battle of the sexes' is based partly on the fear of women as those who menstruate, generate and lactate. Women have a power that men don't have. In Western Christianity the disempowering of women was particularly strong in the mediaeval church. Legends abounded that the Blessed Virgin Mary had given birth without pain. She had delivered her child bloodlessly standing against a pillar. The shedding of blood was the task for Jesus' as he hung upon the cross.

Well, life has moved on. As a wit once remarked: 'The battle of the sexes will never be won because there's too much fraternizing with the enemy.' Quite. But the shedding of blood is no joke. In many parts of the world women are still downtrodden because of their gender. Men and women die needlessly in wars that seem to have lost any sense or reason – assuming at they had any in the first place. The shedding of blood by both Mary and Christ was God's final word to humanity that blood is to be spilled only in the service of life never its destruction. 'In my beginning is my end' wrote T. S. Eliot. The Alpha and the Omega assures us of our destiny and shapes our lives.
