S. Mary Cleophas is shown on the Screen to the Lady Chapel. This title occurs only in John 19:25. A comparison of the lists in Mark 15:40 and Matthew 27:56 of those who stood at the foot of the cross would seem to identify her with Mary, the mother of James the Less and Joseph (and some say also of Simon and Mary Salome, the mother of the Apostles James the Greater and John). According to some interpretations, she was also among the women that on Easter morning went to the tomb to anoint Jesus' body with spices. Matthew 28:1 calls her "the other Mary" to distinguish her from Mary Magdalene, while Mark 16:1 uses the name "Mary of James", most probably derived from James the Less. Luke 24:18 identifies one of the persons who walked with Our Lord on the road to Emmaus after His resurrection as "Cleopas". Some commentators believe that the other was this Mary, his wife. The questions raised by the writings of S. Jerome, Papias, Hegesippus and the apocryphal Gospel of Philip are best left to the Experts.. [photo: David Peet

Letter from Michael

Dear friends,

During May the Season of Easter closes with a new beginning! On May the 15th we come together to celebrate Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit on the disciples, and the wisdom and strength it gave the early church to go out and draw people to God.

This work was both Spirit filled teaching and actions in the name of Christ. In the words of James: 'Faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead' (James 2.17) Unless we apply our faith, seen through the lens of Christ, in the world around us we are not following the call of Jesus.

It is no accident that this is also the start of Christian Aid Week, when we think of those less fortunate than ourselves, both here in the UK and around the world.

Have we experienced the outpouring of the Holy Spirit for ourselves? Is this an experience that we need to come together and share? Could we invite those outside the church to share with us?

The Annual Meeting was held on Sunday 24 April. Mary Ashwin and Mary Lumetta were elected to serve as the Churchwardens for another year. William Nye continues as the Deanery Synod representative and the elected members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) are: Sarah Daniels, Phil de Grouchy, Robert Gwynne, Chan Mayor, Will Parry, David Peet & Alexia Prakas. Jackie McHenry decided not to stand again. Many thanks to Jackie for all that she has contributed during the time that she has served on the PCC.

The PCC has now received £112,500 from the estate of the late Patrick Graham. Patrick's affairs have not been quite finalized so there may be a little money to come. The PCC now has to decide what to do with the legacy. Patrick asked that it be used for 'the beautification of the church - possibly an organ case'. Unfortunately, an organ case would cost much more that what Patrick has left St Cyprian's. Another idea might be to repaint the interior but because the existing paintwork will need to be stripped off first, that is likely to cost around £250k. Patrick's executor has been asked if any of his friends wish to contribute further but no offers have been forthcoming. If you have an opinion about how Patrick's money is spent or ideas about further fundraising then please contact Fr Gerald.
